THE TEXT

1- Amy Uprichard is determined to help any other child forced to spend the holiday season in a hospital bed. For cancer patient Amy, the festive joy was brought crashing down last year when she was admitted to hospital on Christmas Eve. The 18-year-old suffered a setback following a bone marrow transplant and was forced to spend Christmas Day and New Year separated from her family.

2- **The Northern Ireland dancer** has started an appeal to collect new toys to hand out to youngsters being treated in the Royal Victoria Hospital for Sick Children this Christmas. Amy is appealing for help by donating toys which must be new for hygiene reasons. "Christmas is a time of year that we love to spend at home with our family enjoying all the things we love most," she said. "Unfortunately, not everyone is so lucky to be able to spend their Christmas at home. I know from personal experience what it is like to spend it in hospital sick. It really doesn't feel like Christmas at all."

3- Amy was 16 when she was diagnosed in May 2013 with acute leukaemia and spent six months in and out of hospital receiving chemotherapy before being put on the bone marrow transplant list. Luckily her younger sister Gemma, 13, was a match and in November 2014, Amy underwent her transplant. Speaking about her sister's bravery, Amy said: "She had to go through something that was quite scary for her being so young. She did it and she would do it all again."

4- Amy was in hospital for four weeks following the transplant, then started to recover well and was told she was in remission in February 2015. "I got back to everything I loved to do, dancing and everything," she said. "I even tried a little bit of school work." But Amy insists that despite the setback, things could not be better for her now and she wants to use her experience to help others. Determined, she completed all her GCSEs from her hospital bed and has achieved her A Level in business studies. She now hopes to become a dance teacher and is currently running her own business, selling dance clothes.
