I. READING COMPREHENSION (15 marks)

THE TEXT

1- In 2007, I visited a client as a financial adviser and picked up a virus. I became mute. I wasn't concerned when I started to experience cold-like symptoms, and my husky voice was more of an irritation than a worry. My doctor assured me it would soon return to normal. Instead, it got worse. I could no longer make phone calls and started carrying a little whiteboard to write everything down. I tried to work mostly with people I already knew, who were likely to be more patient with me; but explaining things to investors with a marker pen was a big challenge.

2- By May of the following year, it was clear this might be long-term. Weeks of speech therapy made no difference. At home, my wife and teenage sons adjusted as best as they could. New technologies helped with my day-to-day life. Soon I was using a computer that read out phrases typed into it –not enough to save my job. My career had been a big part of my life, and losing it was a blow to my confidence. Friendships foundered as I turned down invitations, unwilling to sit in silence as conversations carried on around me. My relationship with my wife, Joanna, deteriorated and eventually we divorced.

3- In the summer of 2010, I received a text from my ex-wife telling me her dad had seen a news story about a waitress who'd had her voice restored by a doctor in Cleveland. **It had to be worth a shot.** At the appointment, Dr Milstein said, "I might be able to help you." It was the first time anyone had said that to me. We did some vocal exercises to stretch the muscles in my neck and to my astonishment I started to make sounds. It was the first time I'd heard my voice in three and a half years.

4- I phoned my parents and jokingly introduced myself to them. Friends were happy to hear my voice again and even when I was alone, I talked to myself. I don't regret those years of silence. I spent more time with my boys and had time to think about where I'd gone wrong as a husband and parent. **That time smoothed my rough edges.** I prefer who I am now.

Working women today have it better than ever before. But few people agree on how to help them rise further. If both female and male became more "gender intelligent" about how their work and behavioural preferences are innate, it would to a more harmonious workforce. Women have been choosing to leave companies at twice the of men. Women often tell their bosses that they are quitting for personal reasons, but the majority leave because they feel excluded from teams and not for their contributions. Yet, the reality is that women often have communicating with other women at work as well. Women also often lack the financing that male entrepreneurs enjoy.
