I. READING COMPREHENSION

THE TEXT

1. I had a lot of illnesses when I was young, and wasn't at school very often. I was bright, but I would skive a lot. I left when I was 15, before I'd taken my GCSEs. Around that time, I met my son's dad, and at 19, I fell pregnant. It was a bad, violent relationship that made me live in fear all the time. I wanted to go back to college but never stuck anything out. My life was getting more and more chaotic – I started taking drugs and committing crimes to get money. It came to an awful stop in 2004 when I received a life sentence.
2. Going to prison was horrific. I was in shock. I wouldn't say anything or know anyone. I would take all sorts of concoctions to get me obliterated. But I owe it all to dad. He would write to me every week saying: "Emma, education, education, education." At a point, I must have started listening. It was when the prison began offering more than just the basic classes that I took GCSEs in English and Sociology. Later, I decided to apply to do a degree in English Literature.
3. Such an accomplishment was far from easy in prison. At first, I was embarrassed about going to library and would hide books. However, when I started to care less, I noticed other girls start trying as well, asking me for advice on stuff. Some even looked to me as an example. If I were talking to the inmates in there, I would say there's this enormous sense of achievement every time you hit a target or deadline. When you have been in abusive relationships, achieving something makes a massive difference to your confidence.
4. I came out of prison earlier this year. I'm volunteering with two charities at present. Being myself a victim of domestic abuse, I'm now working with women who go through the same ordeal. This way, I've managed to stop many people from ending up where I did. I feel a million miles away from that person now. I have a great relationship with my son. My dad has my degree certificate on his wall at home. I probably did it all for them as much as for me. I would urge anyone in prison to value themselves and their own worth.

Hospitals admission for eating disorders have risen 37% across all age groups in the last two years, figures show. Psychiatrists and in eating disorders say the figures are worrying and show that more needs to be done to support people before they reach point. Dr Agnes Ayton, of the faculty of eating disorders at the Royal College of Psychiatrists, said the rise was an alarming sign that the problem was not being treated in its early stages. She also said that "the causes are complex, and much more research needs to be done in light of these Anecdotaly, reasons could include pressures on children in schools, and advertisements encouraging unrealistic ideas of body image. Hospitalization is the tip of the iceberg. In fact, people do not often help early enough. As a result, they reach a critical state when it's not to manage their treatment in the community."
